
Aim of the booklet

What is in my care plan?




Who makes my care plan?

Staff make care plans to make sure everybody is safe.
Staff used a set of guidelines to make my care plan the best it can be.

Guidelines for staff

Staff will ask for my help to make my care plan.
Staff will think about my needs when making my care plan.
Staff check to make sure all the information in my care plan is correct.
New Staff need to read my care plan to support me.
